When Children Should Stay Home from School

During this time of year there are several colds and flus around. These can spread amongst others quite easily. For the health of the staff, students, and volunteers in the school, we ask that you take into consideration keeping your child home from school until they are well again. Please contact the school if your child has a contagious infection. A deep clean of the classroom may be required.

Fever - Keep your children home if they have a fever. Wait until children are fever-free before letting them return to school.

Diarrhea/Vomiting - Keep children home if they've vomited twice or more in the last 24 hours. They can return to school after symptoms clear up or your doctor says they're no longer contagious.

Severe cough and cold symptoms - Keep kids home from school. A serious cough could be a sign of contagious conditions like whooping cough, viral bronchitis, or croup.

Pinkeye - is contagious, and children should stay home from school for the first 24 hours after treatment begins.
